1. Vanilla is the second most expensive spice in the world, after saffron, as a result of its long and labour-intensive cultivation. Part of the orchid family, vanilla beans are hand-pollinated on family farms. Each flower opens for only one part of a day during the season, if it is not pollinated on that day, no pod is produced. Once picked, the curing process, which involves drying the beans in the sun by day and allowing them to sweat in a box at night, takes three to six months. The main producers of food grade vanilla, known as black vanilla because of the colour of the dried pods, are Madagascar, followed by Mexico and Tahiti. Vanilla from each country has its own distinctive characteristics but it is Madagascar vanilla that produces the creamy, sweet flavour beloved of Britons.

2. One can get vanilla extract all over the world but Madagascar vanilla is chosen because it has the greatest depth of flavour. There are three main commercial preparations of whole beans, powder and extract. Extract is sold by the "fold" – a unit that denotes the weight of vanilla beans per gallon. Silver Spoon, which distributes the American Nielsen-Massey vanilla brand in the U.K., said: "The market price of vanilla has risen over the past 12 months and sharply over the last 12 weeks. This has been driven largely by a poor-quality harvest in Madagascar. Soaring prices will hurt companies that use the ingredient in everything from soft drinks to cakes and perfumes. But the pain will be felt most acutely by ice-cream makers, as it is the most expensive ingredient in the production process and some will be forced to pass on the increased cost to consumers."

3. When prices are high, market experts say, farmers are tempted to pick beans early. That leads to a less intense flavour, compounding problems in the

market. The high-value crop is also a target for criminals. There are reports that vanilla farmers in the Madagascar harvested their 2015 crop prematurely, in fear of losing their production to thieves. This, coupled with inadequate drying in order to increase profits from their crop, has led to lower quality vanilla. The combination of high process and poor quality means some manufacturers are turning to synthetic alternatives. But many food brands are not open to using artificial flavourings.

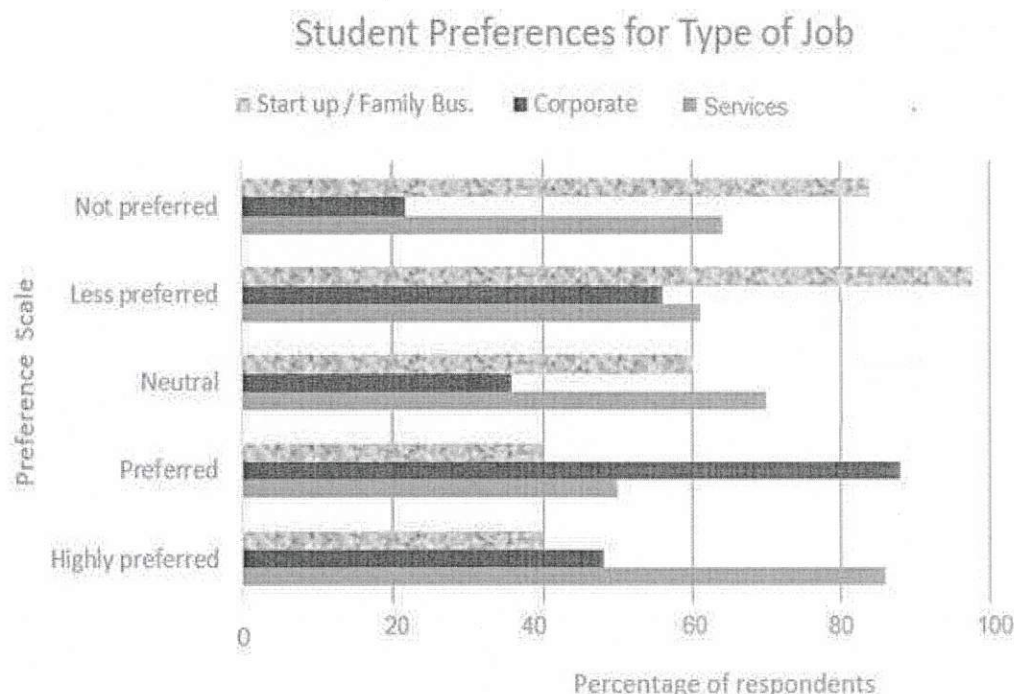
2. Read the following passage carefully:

1. A recent survey was conducted among 2,000 college students and young professionals to analyse preferences for different types of jobs, including corporate roles, personal start-ups or family businesses, and service professions (example - defense, nursing, police). The study aimed to identify trends in career aspirations, the factors influencing these preferences and their implications for workforce planning and education systems. Participants were asked to rank their preferences on a five-point scale.

2. The study covered respondents across urban and semi-urban areas, representing diverse educational, economic, and cultural backgrounds. Researchers ensured diversity in gender, socioeconomic status and career

stages to make the findings representative of a broad spectrum of opinions. Data collection involved online questionnaires and in-person interviews, ensuring a comprehensive understanding of job preferences. The data was displayed as a bar graph given below.



3. Corporate jobs were commonly associated with financial stability, growth opportunities and access to structured career paths. Start-ups and family businesses, on the other hand, appealed to those valuing autonomy, creativity, and the chance to work in more flexible environments. Service professions were perceived as fulfilling and prestigious, especially among individuals motivated by a sense of duty.

4. The survey also highlighted several challenges. Geographic variations were significant, with urban respondents gravitating more towards corporate roles, while semi-urban participants showed a stronger inclination for service professions and family businesses. Respondents indicated limited mentorship opportunities and a lack of clarity about the long-term prospects of non-corporate careers as barriers influencing their decisions.

5. The findings provide a foundation for further research into how cultural, regional and generational influences shape career choices. Future studies could explore factors such as gender-based preferences, emerging industries, mentorship availability, and the role of technological advancements in shaping job markets. Additionally, longitudinal research could track how these preferences evolve as respondents advance in their careers. This could help educational institutions and employers develop tailored strategies to better align with the aspirations and values of young job seekers. Moreover, policies encouraging skill development and mentorship programmes may bridge the

gaps identified in this survey, ensuring more informed career decisions among youth.
